



UPDATE 3

HOW THE PYP WILL LOOK IN EACH AGE GROUP

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

We hope our recent updates have provided greater clarity regarding the IB Primary Years Programme (PYP). The PYP is a flexible framework that supports every learner's developmental stage, encouraging students to draw upon expert knowledge from the immediate community and wider sources. We look forward to our Southwell families engaging in learning within the school, connecting the home and classroom by drawing on the expertise our parents and wider community members offer.

This week, we will move into the practical application, exploring exactly what the PYP will look like for each

age group.

Year 1 & 2: Building a Foundation of Inquiry

In our junior school, the PYP fosters joyful learning through curiosity and exploration. The curriculum structure will not change significantly as we remain committed to prioritising foundational skills through explicit teaching of literacy and mathematics. These skills are the essential basis for the inquiry that our older age groups will engage in.

For our younger learners, teachers will also facilitate small, teacher-guided inquiry moments each week as well as Specialist staff who align their context with classroom inquiry.

Year 3 & 4: Developing Research and Collaboration Skills

As students move into Year 3 and 4, the PYP will begin to challenge them to think more critically and to become more independent in their learning. However, explicit teaching of literacy and mathematics remain as our foundational focus.



International Baccalaureate (IB) Primary Years Programme (PYP)

Year 3 and 4 students will start to conduct their own small research projects within the Units of Inquiry.

This is where they will practice essential skills in collaboration, communication, and digital literacy. The link between Homeroom and Specialist subjects becomes more explicit as they see how maths is used to analyse data, and how writing is used to create a compelling argument.



Year 5 & 6: Applying Skills and Taking Action

For our Year 5 and 6 learners, PYP emphasises the application of core knowledge. Literacy and mathematics are taught explicitly in dedicated classes, but these foundational skills are also applied directly through inquiry. This structure ensures students are constantly connecting knowledge gained in the core curriculum and making active links between subjects.

For example, in a PYP unit, students might connect Science (understanding sustainable energy sources), Technology (using coding or design software to model a solution), and Mathematics (calculating energy consumption, budget, and efficiency ratios) to design and propose a solution to a real-world environmental challenge.

The PYP encourages students to not only learn about the world but to take action to make a positive impact.

This involves researching community needs and planning projects, putting all their accumulated skills into practice.

This learning journey culminates in an opportunity to share their learning publicly, demonstrating their indepth inquiry and presentation of real-world issues.



Year 7 & 8: Independent Inquiry and Taking Action

For our Year 7 and 8 students, our goal is to foster inquiry, critical thinking, and independent learning to equip them for any future environment.

Literacy and mathematics continue to be taught explicitly within the timetable. These foundational skills are then applied directly through advanced inquiry, ensuring continuous connection between subjects and real-world application.

A key element of this stage is developing a growth mindset. Students are supported to fail safely, viewing setbacks as essential opportunities to reset, refocus, and innovate.

This high level of student-driven learning is supported by a transdisciplinary approach, where Specialist and Homeroom teachers collaborate. Students now drive their own context and inquiry, utilising teachers as facilitators to challenge ideas and guide research. They are challenged to ask complex questions, develop sophisticated research skills, and take well-considered action.





Twenty-five years ago, Corey Armstrong, a popular and talented teen footy player is killed in a hit and run on a dark and dangerous road.


The mystery of his death has never been solved and the close knit town where it happened has never forgotten.

SICK PUPIL GUIDELINES PLEASE KEEP THIS NOTICE FOR FUTURE REFERENCE

In order for pupils to gain maximum learning they need to be well. Often a pupil who seemed well at home can find it difficult to cope with the focus required whilst at school.

Parents need to have:

- An alternative person available should their child be unwell and a parent is unable to care for them.
- Your alternative person's contact details should be up to date and given to the administration staff.

In consideration of other pupils and staff at Southwell School, the following criteria has been developed:

ILLNESS	RECOMMENDED RECOVERY TIME
Vomiting	Until 24 hours after LAST vomit
Diarrhoea	Until 24 hours after last runny bowel motion
Conjunctivitis	Until eye discharge has ceased
Measles	For at least 4 days after onset of rash
Whooping Cough	For 5 days after antibiotic treatment commenced
Mumps	For 9 days or until swelling has gone
Chicken Pox	For 7 days from the onset of the rash or when the scabs are dry
School Sores	Until 24 hours after antibiotics started
Streptococcal Throat	Until 24 hours from commencement of treatment
Covid 19	Please check the current requirements on the Ministry of Health

These guidelines have been developed to ensure the pupil is completely well before returning to school, and therefore less likely to become unwell again. The guidelines are also in place to protect other pupils and the staff at Southwell School.

Medication Policy: If your child requires medication to be administered during the school day, please can you bring it to school in the container it has been dispensed in by the pharmacy - it is helpful if the pharmacy can dispense into two lots (one for school and one for home) and drop it into the clinic. On the first day the medication is to be given at school you will need to complete a 'Medication Request' form - available from the office of the clinic.

Nut Allergy: We have several pupils who are ANAPHYLACTIC if they have nuts. Some of these pupils are anaphylactic even if they are exposed to nuts (peanuts in particular). We would ask that you avoid sending food to school which contains nuts e.g. mixed nuts, muesli bars, peanut butter sandwiches, nutella sandwiches etc. They do not have a minor reaction, but a serious reaction they can die from. These pupils have EpiPens (prepackaged adrenaline) at school with them, because of the serious nature of their allergy.
